Michael Johnson has been a staple in the city as the Community Outreach Coordinator in the City of Alexandria, Virginia, since 1993. Johnson is also a consultant with the National Drug Court and a founding member of the Social Responsibility Group and The Friends of Fredrick Douglass Memorial Cemetery. He is also involved in the City Archaeological Commission and the Alexandria African American Hall of Fame. Johnson's roots in Alexandria run deep—his ancestry can be traced to Alexandria in 1816.
